Reflections of a Beginner

About a year and a half ago, I decided to retire. I told my wife that I was moseying into full retirement. She reminded me our marriage contract required one of us to leave the house every day. With that in mind, she signed me up for bridge lessons. I took 12 lessons from Kathy Plauché, who was a very patient, inspiring, clear-minded teacher. At first, I played bridge with my wife, who is a more experienced player. The first game we played together; we came in second to last. I told her that would never happen again. True to my word, the next day we came in last.

In January, I began playing in the Monday 199 game and in the Tuesday 299 game. And sometimes, I even went to the dark side joining in the Wednesday 750 game. Regardless of the level in which I was playing, regardless of my partner or opposition, I was able to maintain the last and second to last place.

During this time of playing, one, two or three hundred people told me to get my trumps out. I was a hoarder of trumps. I thought of them as gold coins that I would need later in the game. I was told "Get the children off the street." They would say "You are not pulling your trumps." And, one day, I realized that if I changed one word, instead of "get your trumps out," to "get their trumps out," it made more sense. This revelation greatly improved my game.

A great teacher once told me to embrace No Trump. A lot of novices like me avoided No Trump. But then it dawned on me that once trumps had been pulled, the game turned into a No Trump. So, I learned to embrace No Trump.

I believe a common mistake for brand new players is that they stop the bidding sooner than they should. I was one of them. One heart, two hearts, that was enough for me. At some point, Kathy had told me to have faith in the points. It was an epiphany. In order to make a good score, I had to follow and trust the points. Finally, I was told that if I wanted to improve, I had to play more, take lessons, and read books.

SWISS ASSIGNMENTS

There are two computer programs that help the directors handle Swiss team events. One is ACBL SCORE, which handles ACBL face-to-face events. The other is BBO, which is a widely used online system, and the system we use for our online Swiss games.

One question people ask is, "How do ACBL SCORE and BBO match teams in Swiss team events?" The systems are similar. In face-to-face games, if all teams are in the computer (and so their ACBL masterpoint totals are known to the computer), directors will start the game by power-matching (the strongest teams playing against each other, etc.). If any teams are not known to the computer, directors will start Round 1 by matching teams randomly. BBO starts the first round using the same power matching used in face-to-face games where all players' masterpoints are known. So, on BBO Swiss in Round 1, if you are the 13th highest team in terms of number of masterpoints, you will play Round 1 against the team with the 14th highest number of masterpoints.

In Round 2, both systems use how you did in Round 1. If you earned the highest score in Round 1 (most Victory Points), in Round 2 you would play against the team that earned the second highest Victory Points score in Round 1.

One difference between BBO and ACBL score comes when there are an odd number of teams. ACBL score handles an odd number of teams by having a round robin, which involves three teams. If there is an odd number of teams, such as 29, ACBL SCORE will put three teams in a round robin. In round 1, the round robin will be the three teams with the lowest ACBL masterpoints. In the following rounds, it will be the teams with the three lowest scores in the event so far. BBO cannot handle a round robin, so it adds subs. So, if there are 29 teams registered, BBO will round up to 30 by using subs. BBO counts all subs as A flight.


Another difference between ACBL SCORE and BBO is that ACBL score is programmed to prevent teams from playing the same opponent twice, sometimes called revenge matches. Note, in small Swiss events, such as 6 teams, there may still be revenge matches. BBO will occasionally have revenge matches, depending on how the teams scored.

If you need a partner or teammates, text or call Lil, 504 330 1158 (lmrange) or Dave, 419 575 4513 (3392627). The Swiss games are Sunday at 2 pm CST, and Thursday at 6:50 pm CST. They are 20 boards, a little over two hours, stratified. For September through February, Swiss events will be GNT (Grand National Teams) and award extra points, red and black.

PAUL'S DEAL OF THE MONTH

The auction was a simple 1NT BY South and 3NT by North.

West was tempted to lead a high spade but settled on the solid diamonds (J1098) leading the Jack to avoid providing a likely gift of an unearned trick. The declarer, South, was an experienced IMPs player and was interested in collecting nine NT tricks after noticing all of the "holes" in the N/S hands. His first play after winning the Jack of diamonds with the Queen, a low club, ducked in both hands, surprised everyone at the table. He was careful to win the second diamond with the King, leaving the Ace on the table as an entry to the clubs. After next finessing against the club King, which was offside, all understood the reason for his first play, as the clubs could still be reached through the diamond



Ace. In the end, our declarer was the only one to win nine tricks and make 3NT on the button. True, he had given up all chances of making an overtrick, but he had earned a cold top by doing so.


