## A PRIMER ON SELECTING EVENTS AT THE UPCOMING NATIONAL TOURNAMENT IN NEW ORLEANS

For those of you who are not experienced at larger tournaments or in team events, please read on!!

There are two main event types each day at the Nationals – Teams and Pairs. Pair play is scored by Match Points and team play by the IMP (International Match Point) scale. This scale is printed on your score card. As you know, Match Point scoring gives you 1 point for every pair you beat (even if just by 10 points) and ½ point for every pair you tie. The key to Match Point scoring is HOW OFTEN, not by HOW MUCH you beat your opponents.

**IMP scoring** on the other hand is different in that the key to winning is HOW MUCH, not HOW OFTEN you beat your opponents. With this scoring scheme, the winning strategy is to bid and make close vulnerable games and slams as these will score so much more with the game and slam bonus added. Remember, making your contract is paramount and a mere overtrick or undertrick in IMP scoring will rarely be determinative in winning - in Match Point scoring this can be crucial.

At the upcoming Nationals, the most popular events will likely be the two-session Bracketed Round Robin teams, regular Swiss teams and two-session and one-session pairs events. Many of the pair events are restricted by upper Masterpoints requirements (Gold Rush Pairs for example require both members of a pairing to have 750 or less Masterpoints). Check the total Masterpoint restrictions in advance and pick events that most closely match your skill level. In addition, the events will be flighted within the overall Masterpoint limits. As a general rule, events without an upper Masterpoint limit (Open) will have a stronger field.

**Team Bracketing** means the teams are placed into brackets of 8 teams of similar total Masterpoint holdings and you play the other teams in your bracket once. This is generally believed to be fairer because in a regular Swiss your reward for winning early matches is getting more difficult opponents in later rounds. In the Round Robin format, your new opponent is not a function of your current score — it's a pre-determined schedule.

Pair events are generally one or two sessions in length. If you select a two-session event, you must play in both sessions to get awards. Two-session events with an upper Masterpoint limit of at least 750 will award Gold points to overall and section winners. One-session events are frequent but to obtain Gold points, you must play in at least two sessions of the SAME SERIES and finish in the Open overalls. There are pair series scheduled almost every day and as these events are Open, competition can be tough. You do not need to play with the same partner in other sessions of a pair series to get Gold points, but in addition to finishing in the Open overalls, you must play in at least two sessions of the same series.

**My humble opinion** is that Bracketed, Round Robin teams and restricted two-session Pairs events (Gold Rush e.g.) are the best avenues for Gold. Remember, you can play in 3 sessions a day for 10 days and 2 sessions on the final day. Don't give up if you have a bad day. GOOD LUCK AND HAVE FUN!!

#### **TEAM GAMES** By Lil Range

Bridge players often find the different types of team games confusing. All Swiss events have commonalities. One, team events involve four people playing on the same team. Two, team events all allow for the possibility of substitutes, so they may in actuality be five- or six-person teams. Everyone who plays at least half the time gets all the points that the team earns. Typically, the team must declare the members (if there are more than 4) at the start of the event. Three, team events all give you a score after each round. So, you can see how you are doing throughout the event, rather than waiting until the end as happens in a pairs game.

**Swiss team** games start with the teams paired by number of points on the team, so that the teams with the highest number of points start against each other. If your team is in the middle of the field in terms of numbers of points, you will start against another team that is in the middle of the field. Then, if you win, you play against other teams that won, and if you lose you play against other teams that lost. In-person events usually pair you against new teams every round. If the Swiss game is **stratified**, then your team has a chance to place overall, but your team also has the chance to place against the other teams in your level. So, you can win overall, but you can also win in B or C bracket as well. The online Sunday Swiss is stratified.

**Bracketed Swiss** teams divide teams, depending on the number of entries, into groups of similar levels. For example, if there are 49 teams, the division might be groups of 7. The team plays all 6 of the other teams in their level. An advantage here is that you are consistently playing against teams of roughly the same level as your team. Bracketed events typically give the team credit for all the other teams in lower brackets.

**Round Robin** is a term that is used to describe an in-person Swiss team event in which there is an odd number of team in the field, for example 29. If there is an odd team (well, odd in the sense of numbers), then there will always be a round robin group. In this group, there will be three teams playing each other, and each team will have to wait for two rounds to see how they are doing. For example, teams 27, 28, and 29 might be the round robin group. North/South 27 will play against East/West 28 one round, and East/West 29 the other round. BBO does not currently have the capability of handling odd numbers of teams, so that if there are 29 entries, BBO will add a table of substitutes.


**Knockout** team events eliminate approximately half the field each round. So, if you start with 16 teams the first round, the second round will involve 8 teams, the third round (semi-finals) 4 teams, and the final round 2 teams. Typically, a knockout event will have two rounds in the early part of the day, say 10 a.m., and two rounds later in the day, say 3 p.m. Often the initial number of teams is not as easily divided as 16, so sometimes teams can lose one initial round but win in the other and advance to the afternoon part of the event. Teams that get knocked out in the 10 a.m. part of the event are free to play in another event in the 3:00 schedule.

**Flighted** team games are similar to bracketed. Flighted events typically have three flights, A, B, and C, and teams play only against other teams in their flights.

#### PAUL'S DEAL OF THE MONTH

Hand 14 in the club tournament of July 8th is a good example of the defense being able to achieve a good save. Most Easts would open 3S with that suit and shape. Because it is usually better to bid rather than to pass in questionable situations, we would expect South to make a takeout double or to bid 4H. West would certainly bid some number of spades with such support, probably 4S but perhaps more, and North should be adventurous enough to offer 5H or more likely 6H. Whether or not East saves or passes, West will surely more likely save than pass, recognizing the possibility that there could be two spade voids. We leave it to the reader to work out how and why North can make 6H double dummy and why South cannot succeed without a ruff and sluff on opening lead or with a



double dummy opening club lead. But would E/W always save in this case? Or would N/S make 6H under the circumstances?.
