Redoubles #2 **By Sue Himel**

While there are numerous conventional and advanced agreements that use redoubles, this column will discuss only the most common uses of the call.

The most frequent use of a redouble occurs after your right-hand opponent (RHO) makes a take -out double of your partner's bid:

- 1) With less than 10 points, make the same call you would make if your RHO had passed.
- 2) With 10 or more points and a four-card major, bid that major.
- 3) With 10 or more points and a 5-card suit, redouble.

Why shouldn't you redouble with a balanced hand that contains one or both 4-card majors? The suit may well be lost in the auction if you bypass the major to redouble.

| Partner | RHO | You | LHO |

You hold:

| 1) | S QJT32 H K8 D A86 C J65 | Redouble. You have enough points and a 5-card suit that you can get into the auction later. Let partner know you have a decent hand. |

| 2) | S KJ74 H A52 D 9432 C 83 | Bid 1S. With less than 10 points, just make your normal bid. |
| 3) | S A3 H KQT5 D KJ93 C Jxx | Bid 1H. If you redouble and left-hand opponent bids 1S, the heart suit may be lost. If the auction comes back to you, a 2H bid would promise a 5+ card suit |

Since all of responder's bids at the 1 level are forcing, there is no danger that partner will pass your bid. Bidding a suit in this auction does not deny 10+ points. But be careful. Non jump bids at the 2 level are not forcing.

| You hold: S J8 I | I 94 D J76 C K | QJ753 | Bid 2C. This is not forcing and suggests a place to play. You should have a good suit and not much else. |

Paul's Deal of the Month


This is the 2nd column in the series to demonstrate the great offensive potential of strong, shapely hands.

The opponents passed throughout the auction.

If South had not done a jump shift, they could also have gotten to the same place by making a series of forcing bids.

It was unusual for both of our hands to hold singleton clubs, and perhaps I should have bid 6H myself, relying upon a diamond finesse if necessary. All ended well when partner held both the diamond king and a singleton club. Bidding and making 6H is double good luck, despite my timidity.

So how would your partnership have bid this difficult hand, and what would be the final contract?

Basics from the Director

FAT THUMB SYNDROME: I would like to begin every article with "DO NOT LET THE OPPONENTS MAKE THE RULING WHEN ANY INFRACTKION OCCURS." The slightest difference could change the outcome. What if you place your bid on the table, then look down and see that it is not the bid you intended. No matter how you plead, the opponents will say you cannot change your bid—FALSE. If your partner has not bid, even though you LHO has bid, and you did not change your mind, you MAY change the bid. Your LHO may also change his bid if he desires. It is best to look at your bid before placing it on the table, but the director could save you IF CALLED.
