# President's Message July 2022

The Wes Busby Firecracker Tournament is scheduled July 7th through July 9th. The Saturday game will be a two-session bracketed Swiss team game. All players are encouraged to play as much as they can. Lunch and snacks will be provided. As part of our effort to boost participation, we are going to start a Swiss team game on the third Saturday of every month. The first game will be at 1:00 on Saturday July 16th. After much discussion, the board voted to keep the 750-master point limit in place indefinitely for the Wednesday games except for STAC weeks. The Wednesday game will be open and stratified during STAC weeks.

Hurricane Ida repairs are about 96% complete. We have received the final payment from our insurance company. We will not pay the final \$14,000 we owe until all of the work is completed. Our out-of-pocket cost will be slightly less than \$18,000.

#### FOR THE I/N CROWD Slam Bidding, The Power Slam Part 1 By Sue Himel

No, I am not going to teach you Roman Keycard or Minorwood. Let's talk about how to decide if slam is a good possibility.

When you and partner have combined assets of 33 high card points or more, you should probably bid a small slam.

West Pass	North 1NT	East Pass	South ?	You hold: S AQ76 H KQ5 D QJT C A83 This is easy. Partner has 15-17 points, you have 18 Points. Your side has 33-35 high card points so you bid 6NT. You don't have enough for a grand slam (38-40 points). Don't bother with Stayman on this hand, just bid the NT slam. It scores better than a major suit slam which		
				is important when playing pairs (matchpoint scoring).		
West Pass	North 1NT	East Pass	South ?	You hold: S AT76 H KJ5 D QJT3 C AJ This one is not so easy. You may or may not have enough points for a slam with your 16. How can you find out if partner is on the top or bottom of his 1NT bid? Bid 4NT. After a direct opening bid of 1NT, 4NT is not any form of Blackwood. It is what we call a quantitative bid. It asks partner if they are on the top or bottom of their opening bid. With 15 high card points, opener should pass. With 17 high card points, opener should bid 6NT. With 16, opener should consider bidding a slam if he has a 5-card suit or extra good spot cards and controls.		


When opener's first bid or last bid is some number of NT, responder's 4NT bid is quantitative and does not ask for aces, with one exception. If you want to ask for aces use Gerber.

The exception:

West	North	East	South	You hold: S KQT964 H 6 D AK543 C 8	
Pass	1NT	Pass	4H!	After a Texas Transfer, a bid of 4NT asks for aces.	
Pass	4S	Pass	4NT	If opener has 2 aces, you should certainly bid a	
				small slam. If he has 3 aces, you might want to bid a grand	
				slam. When you are planning to play in a	
				suit and you play some form of Keycard Blackwood, you	
				will be able to find out if your trump suit is good enough to	
				be in a slam.	

#### Paul's Deal of the Month

Your RHO opens 2S, weak in first seat. You pass, as does LHO, and your partner reopens with a takeout double. Opener passes. What do you do? Partner could hold many different hands to reopen, so your action is not clear. You could bid 3C, which shows moderate values, or 2NT Lebensohl, which forces to 3C weak, but if partner has a strong hand with a running suit, you could miss 3NT. With two sure tricks in your hand, you could pass and defend on such favorable vulnerability, but that could result in minus 790 if they make it. At matchpoints, why not try for a top and pass. The result



will surprise you; passing seems best to achieve a good score. So here goes--pass it is. You lead your doubleton diamond, which seems to be the safest lead when trying for a ruffing trick, and you strike gold. The result? A stunning +500! Who would not feel safe opening 2S with East 's hand? The European experts, who avoid weak two bids even at matchpoints.

#### **HESITATIONS**

My left-hand opponent took time to THINK before bidding. Now his partner knows he is trying to show the best descriptive bid of the cards in his hand.

Should this be allowed?

Solution: When you need a little time to decide on your bid, your partner should not make a call or play that was demonstrably suggested by the hesitation; he must make his call based on the cards he holds. You should always try to bid in a timely manner. If a hesitation results in unauthorized information, and the opponents have been damaged by the infraction, the Director should award an adjusted score.

Finally, please remember that novice/intermediate players need a little extra thinking time; the right bid or play doesn't come to them as readily as it does to a seasoned player. Allowing then a little leeway, if they occasionally bid or play out of tempo, will earn their appreciation.


